Summary

Spanning 25 minutes, this forthcoming story weaves a poignant tapestry of the life of Lim Ok Soon, a young Korean woman who was orphaned by the Japanese invasion. With little options, she became a picture bride to a Korean immigrant plantation worker in Hawai‘i. With bravery, she navigates the trials of a foreign land, forging a legacy of love and determination. Accompanied by a poignant musical repertoire including “Thinking of Brother,” “Arirang,” and “Danny Boy,” Grammy Award-winning Korean American violist Richard Yonjae O’Neill infuses Lim’s story with deep emotional resonance. Filming in historical landmarks such as Kuli‘ou‘ou Beach Park, Ho‘omaluhia Botanical Gardens, and Nu‘uanu Memorial Park, the story melds history and music seamlessly.






Concluding the film, this 18-minute-long story is a heartfelt musical tribute to the souls who found their rest in Molokai's Kalaupapa. Through hauntingly beautiful renditions of "Aloha 'Oe" and more, the episode immortalizes their memory. The world renowned violinists of Chee-Yun and Ignace "Iggy" Jang, coupled with Keola Beamer's soulful slack-key guitar and vocals, weave a powerful elegy against Kalaupapa's backdrop. Amidst the island's remote landscapes, the story not only showcases resilience in the face of adversity but that home is not a place, it is the people.

Director's Statement

As a journalist and filmmaker, I've always felt a deep connection to my heritage and the untold stories of those who came before me. Songs of Love from Hawai'i is not just a historical account—it's a heartfelt tribute to the courage and dreams of the Korean immigrants who laid down roots in Hawai'i over the past century. Music, like history, has the power to transcend time and borders, and this film represents my effort to weave both into a tapestry that honors my ancestors and preserves their legacies. I hope audiences walk away not just with knowledge of history, but with a sense of the humanity and shared experiences that define us all.

Director's Biography

An award-winning journalist-turned-filmmaker, Jinyoung Lee earned her degree in Journalism and Multimedia from Ewha Womans University in Seoul, Korea. Since her relocation to Hawai'i in 2005, she seamlessly transitioned from journalism to cinema, leveraging her extensive background in Korean media. In 2012, Jinyoung founded Now Production Films, a nonprofit film studio with a vision to create impactful films that bridge gaps between cultures and contribute positively to society. Her debut film, "The Words of Wisdom from the Rainbow State" (2021), received global acclaim and graced prestigious events like the 41st Hawai'i International Film Festival. In her latest project, "Songs of Love from Hawai'i" (2024), Jinyoung merges cultures through music, combining rare historic photographs with enchanting performances by world-renowned musicians.

Matt Yamashita, Director of Photography

An Emmy Award-winning filmmaker from Moloka‘i, earned a BFA in Film Production from Chapman University. As Moloka‘i’s first professional filmmaker, he has been in the industry since 2001, contributing to productions aired on PBS National and Arte France. Matt played key roles in Part 3 of “Songs of Love.”

Yeajee Lee, Producer

A graduate of Ewha Women’s University, was a producer at KBS Korea’s National TV Broadcasting from 2005 to 2014, creating nationally popular programs. In 2015, Yeajee joined SM Group, where she is currently the SM C&C Studio Head, overseeing non-script original contents' content planning. She played a crucial role as a producer in content development for “Songs of Love.”

Michael-Thomas Foumai, Music Composer

Michael is the Director of Artistic Engagement and the first Composer in Residence for the Hawai‘i Symphony Orchestra. His music, described as “vibrant and cinematic” (New York Times) and “full of color, drama, and emotion” (Milwaukee Journal Sentinel), beautifully created melodies for “Songs of Love.”

Gary Pak, Writer

A writer, director, jazz pianist, and Professor Emeritus of English at the University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa, he directed, co-produced, and wrote the full-length documentary Huli, which was invited to HIFF 2020. Pak graduated from Boston University with a BA and from the University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa with an MA and a PhD. Born and raised in Hawai‘i, his grandfathers fled from a Japanese-occupied Korea in 1905. In Songs of Love from Hawai‘i, his storytelling shines in Part 2, drawing from cherished memories with his grandmother, Lim Ok-Soon, who came to Hawai‘i as a picture bride.

Ye Soo-jung, Actress

A renowned South Korean actress since her 1979 debut, is an icon in the industry. Known for her exceptional performances in theater and cinema, she played notable roles in films like *<The Thieves>* (2012), *<TRAIN TO BUSAN>* (2016), and *<Along with the Gods: The Two Worlds>* (2017). Her voice acting in “Songs of Love” Part 2, portraying Lim Ok Soon, adds depth to the film.

Renowned violinist Ignace “Iggy” Jang, Hawai‘i Symphony Orchestra’s concertmaster, captivates audiences worldwide with his extraordinary style, impeccable musicianship, and exquisite timbre. Born to Korean parents in France, Jang’s artistry graces prestigious stages from Paris’ Théâtre des Champs-Elysées to Seoul Arts Center. A graduate of the Paris Conservatory, he earned an Artist Diploma degree from Indiana University and went on to serve as a visiting scholar.

Keola Beamer

Keola Beamer has breathed new life into slack key guitar music yet stays true to its deep Hawaiian roots. He is a Hawaiian legend: singer-songwriter, composer, guitar master, with an impeccable, gorgeous style that is featured on The Descendants soundtrack and his 17 CDs. His music, featured in the Part 3 of “Songs of Love” showcases true humanity.

Chee-Yun

Violinist Chee-Yun, a prodigy from Seoul, enchants audiences with her brilliant concerto performances worldwide. Trained at Juilliard and mentored by renowned instructors, she has graced stages with orchestras like the San Francisco Symphony and NHK Symphony, leaving an indelible mark on the international classical music scene.
